NEW YORK, September 9, 2016 – The Center for the Study of Asian American Health (CSAAH) at NYU School of Medicine’s Department of Population Health will hold its 8th Biennial Asian American (AA) and Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander (NHPI) Health Conference, co-hosted by AARP, called “[Aging Together, Bridging Generations](#)” on Monday, September 26. The goals of this year’s conference are to bring together diverse stakeholders from across the country to prioritize healthy aging and to increase the collection of meaningful disaggregated data about AA and NHPI older adults.

The population of AA and NHPI older adults is one of the fastest growing and diverse older adult populations in the United States and is projected to grow to 8.5 million by 2060, from 1.8 million in 2012. However, there is a lack of targeted health resources, research, and services focused on this growing population.

“The Aging Together conference is a unique event that provides a forum for community-based organizations, hospitals, academic institutions, and nonprofits to engage and collaborate on issues affecting Asian American older adults and their families,” said Daphne Kwok, AARP Vice President of Multicultural Leadership, Asian American and Pacific Islander Audience Strategy. “We are proud to co-host the conference in order to focus attention and conversation around AAPIs 50-plus and hope that it spurs conversation, research and cross-cutting work.”
