The candidates may have chosen not to check a circle.

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Legislative Priority

Question:

What will be your top state priorities if elected, and how will you work to break the gridlock to get things done on these issues?

AARP POSITION

AARP believes that providing quality, affordable health care and improving lifelong financial security should be top legislative priorities. AARP surveys show that Wisconsinites are worried about their health and long-term financial security. They fear the future will not be as prosperous for their children and grandchildren. They face competing demands: affording health care, saving for retirement, sending children to college and supporting aging parents.

Increasingly partisan political gridlock stands in the way of the ability to solve major issues. Wisconsinites want results from elected leaders, not promises without action. It's time for individuals, businesses, non-profit organizations, and government to come together to find solutions.

My top state priorities include:

1. Affordable and accessible health care coverage for all who want it.
2. Education reform that (1) ensures every child has the opportunity for a quality education no matter what type of school they attend, and (2) provides the resources necessary to achieve this goal without overburdening property taxpayers.
3. Nursing home and long-term care reforms that help ensure quality care in all settings.
4. Lowering property taxes, especially for those on fixed incomes.

As with all issues, I will continue to work together in a bipartisan way with my colleagues, advocacy organizations, my constituents and others to achieve these goals.

Health Care Reform

Question:

How would you reform the health care system to make it a quality system that is affordable and accessible for every Wisconsinite?

AARP POSITION

AARP believes that all Wisconsinites deserve affordable, quality, and accessible health care. An individual's health care costs, including premiums, deductibles and out-of-pocket costs should be limited to between 5% and 10% of income. In an AARP Wisconsin survey, 69% of respondents age 50 -64 said the healthcare system is in a "state of crisis" or has "major problems." Those who have insurance and those who are uninsured respond similarly to this question. Over half of all respondents said they would be more likely to vote for a candidate who supported healthcare coverage for all Wisconsin residents.

Three quarters of Wisconsinites age 50-64 without health insurance, are working. Half of Wisconsin's uninsured workers are self-employed or work for small employers. Many Wisconsinites are underinsured, paying too much for inadequate coverage.

Health Care Cost

Question:

How do you propose to rein in the cost of health care while maintaining or improving the quality of and access to health care?

AARP POSITION

Across Wisconsin, individuals and employers are telling us that they can't afford health care; cost sharing is increasing and benefits are shrinking.

According to the Kaiser Family Foundation, health insurance premium costs nationwide have increased a cumulative 78% between 2001 and 2007. In an AARP Wisconsin survey, over eight in ten respondents said that making healthcare more affordable for all residents is extremely or very important.

AARP supports benefit packages that provide necessary care including chronic disease management, prescription drug coverage, prevention and wellness, mental health services. AARP also supports stronger oversight of the insurance industry.

AARP believes information technology, such as electronic medical records, would result in better, more efficient care, fewer mistakes and, ultimately, lower costs.

1. Utilizing the purchasing power of the entire state to negotiate lower prices on health care and prescription drugs for all Wisconsin residents.
2. Increasing transparency in health care pricing and outcomes so consumers have the opportunity to shop for less expensive, quality care.
3. Creating a state hospital ombudsman office to advocate on behalf of uninsured patients, who are often charged considerable more than insured patients for the same procedures.
4. Adequate reimbursements to hospitals for treating patients covered by Medical Assistance (MA) coupled with guaranteed decreases in the rates charged to other patients (whose bills are higher because of MA cost-shifting).
5. Continuing to advocate for enforcement of Wisconsin drug price discrimination law, which requires prescription drug companies to offer all buyers the same low prices given to their most preferred customers.

Senior Care

Question:

*Do you support or oppose the continuation of SeniorCare at current benefit levels?
How would you ensure the SeniorCare program continues beyond December 2009?*

AARP POSITION

AARP Wisconsin and others are working on a plan to improve SeniorCare and provide an even more meaningful benefit to most participants of the program. The plan will be cost neutral to the state and will need legislative approval. According to a recent AARP Rx Watchdog Report, the cost of prescription drugs rose by more than 50%, on average, between 2002 and 2007. In Wisconsin about 100,000 Wisconsinites age 65 and older get help with the cost of their prescription drugs through SeniorCare. However, SeniorCare's future is uncertain because federal funding for the popular program will end in December 2009.

CANDIDATE: PEGGY KRUSICK DEMOCRAT

As author of the legislation that created the framework for SeniorCare, I strongly support continuation of SeniorCare at current benefit levels.

As in the past, I will continue to work with my constituents, colleagues, Wisconsin's congressional delegation, aging advocates and others to strongly urge the federal government to continue funding its portion of SeniorCare beyond December 2009. I will introduce state legislation if necessary to continue the program.
