Medicare Contributes \$1.1 Billion to District of Columbia's Economy

Medicare helped pay the health care costs of 76,103 Medicare beneficiaries in District of Columbia in 2017, allowing its seniors to get the care they need and protecting them from serious financial burdens.

In addition, Medicare is a critical part of the economic infrastructure of District of Columbia, investing about \$1.1 billion in the state in 2017. Thousands of businesses, large and small, including hospitals, nursing homes, physicians' offices and medical device providers, rely on Medicare to exist and maintain their operations. Businesses in District of Columbia receiving Medicare dollars use them to pay employee salaries, rent, and state and local taxes, as well as buy equipment and make capital improvements to their facilities.

In fact, Medicare spending in District of Columbia is equivalent to about 7 percent of spending by state and local governments in District of Columbia.

Here's how much Medicare* spent in District of Columbia by health care service sector:

Hospitals	\$552 million
Physicians	\$246 million
Other health professionals	\$23 million
Skilled nursing facilities	\$82 million
Home health care agencies	\$51 million
Prescription drugs and medical supplies	\$142 million
Durable medical equipment suppliers	\$9 million
Other health care providers	\$11 million

* Medicare only covers short-term skilled care in nursing homes, rehabilitation facilities and at home for an illness or injury; it does not cover long-term services at home or in a nursing home.
