### **Medicare Contributes \$19.5 Billion to North Carolina's Economy**

Medicare helped pay the health care costs of 1.788,687 million Medicare beneficiaries in North Carolina in 2017, allowing its seniors to get the care they need and protecting them from serious financial burdens.

In addition, Medicare is a critical part of the economic infrastructure of North Carolina, investing about \$19.5 billion in the state in 2017. Thousands of businesses, large and small, including hospitals, nursing homes, physicians' offices and medical device providers, rely on Medicare to exist and maintain their operations. Businesses in North Carolina receiving Medicare dollars use them to pay employee salaries, rent, and state and local taxes, as well as buy equipment and make capital improvements to their facilities.

In fact, Medicare spending in North Carolina is equivalent to about 21 percent of spending by state and local governments in North Carolina.

Here's how much Medicare\* spent in North Carolina by health care service sector:

Hospitals	\$8.4 billion
Physicians	\$4.6 billion
Other health professionals	\$687 million
Skilled nursing facilities	\$1.2 billion
Home health care agencies	\$987 million
Prescription drugs and medical supplies	\$3.1 billion
Durable medical equipment suppliers	\$331 million
Other health care providers	\$206 million

\* Medicare only covers short-term skilled care in nursing homes, rehabilitation facilities and at home for an illness or injury; it does not cover long-term services at home or in a nursing home.
