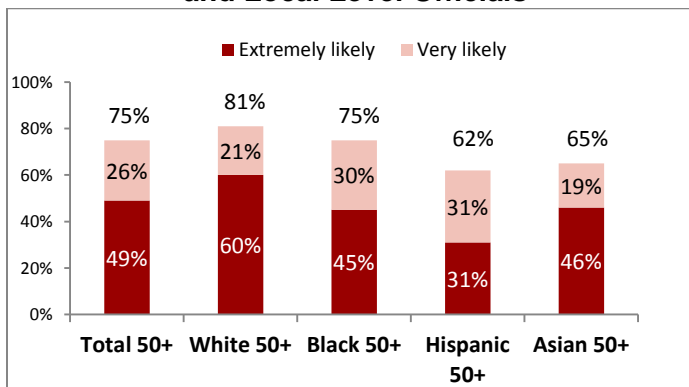


2013 SURVEY OF NYC VOTERS AGE 50+: MULTICULTURAL VOTER ANALYSIS

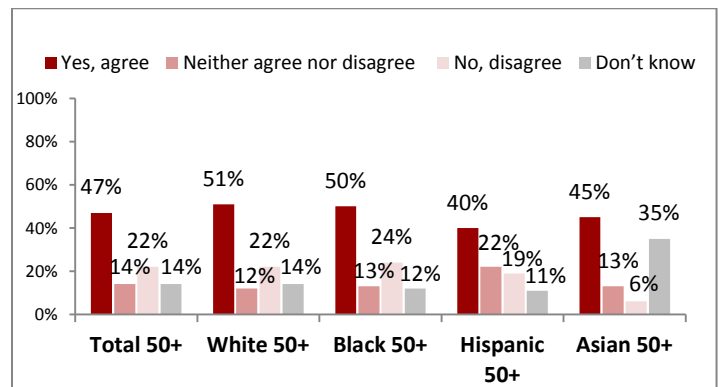
Regardless of multicultural group, 50+ voters want elected officials to work on issues that make NYC a better place for residents to live, work and age, including affordable housing; age discrimination; pedestrian safety; fraud; and caregiving.

Three-quarters of New York City voters age 50 and older say they are extremely (49%) or very (26%) likely to vote in this year’s citywide elections. Majority likelihood to vote holds across all multicultural voters age 50 and older. However, many 50+ voters – including multicultural voters — do not believe mayoral candidates are talking about the issues that matter most to them. More than one-third of Asian voters are unsure on this question, suggesting this voter group is less likely to be receiving candidate messages.

NYC 50+ Voters: Are Mayoral Candidates Talking About Issues that Matter Most to You?



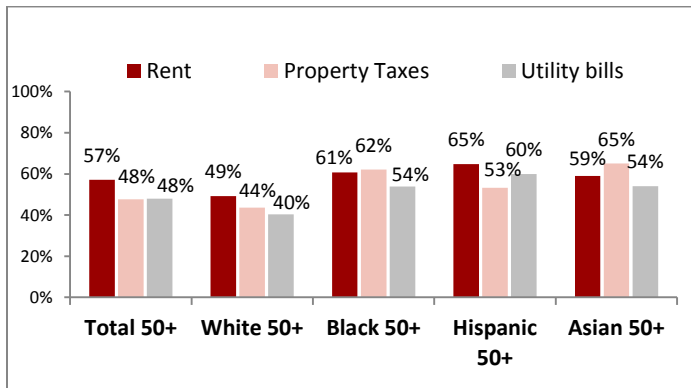
Home & Community

A majority of 50+ voters in NYC rent their homes (61%) and even larger majorities among Black and Hispanic voting groups (70% and 79%, respectively). Among renters, concern about being able to pay rent in the coming years runs high: approximately six in ten renters among Black, Hispanic and Asian 50+ voting groups are extremely or very concerned about future rent costs.

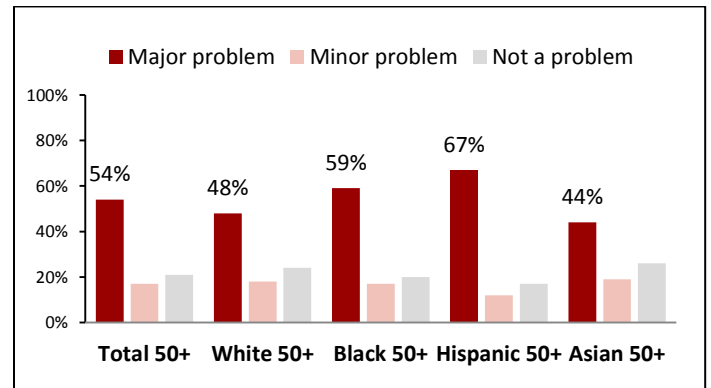
Future costs for property taxes are similarly concerning for about half of all 50+ homeowners (48%) and more so among Black and Asian homeowners (62% and 65%). Nearly half of all 50+ NYC voters (48%) are worried about being able to pay utility costs in the coming years. In general, housing costs are comparatively more concerning among the city’s non-White voter groups.

Lack of affordable housing is considered a “major” concern for a majority of all voters age 50 and older (54%) and especially among Hispanics, where two-thirds feel the lack of affordable housing is a major problem in their community.

NYC 50+ Voters: Extremely/Very Concerned About Ability to Pay Each of the Following in the Coming Years

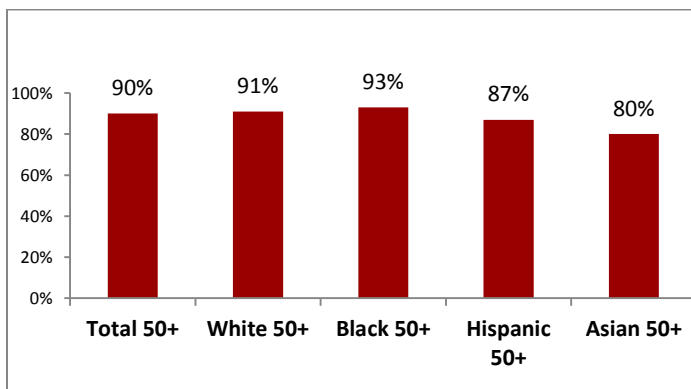


NYC 50+ Voters: Lack of Affordable Housing

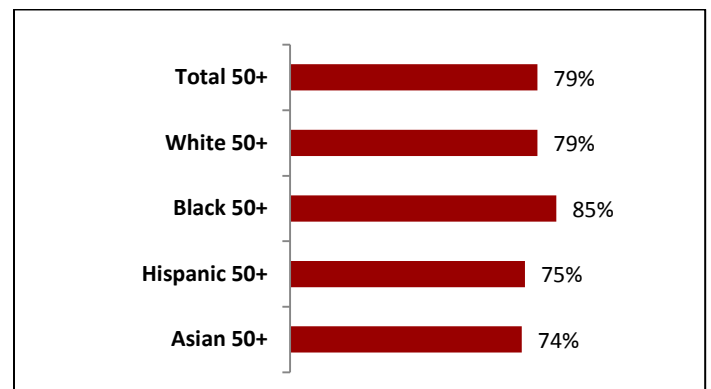


Older adult voters nearly universally agree that it is extremely or very important to be able to stay in your own home as you age. For New Yorkers, the preference to age in their homes and communities is threatened by rising costs of housing. Roughly eight in ten 50+ voters are likely to vote for candidates who will work to ensure they can afford to stay in their homes.

NYC 50+ Voters: Extremely/Very Important to be able to Stay in Current Home as Age

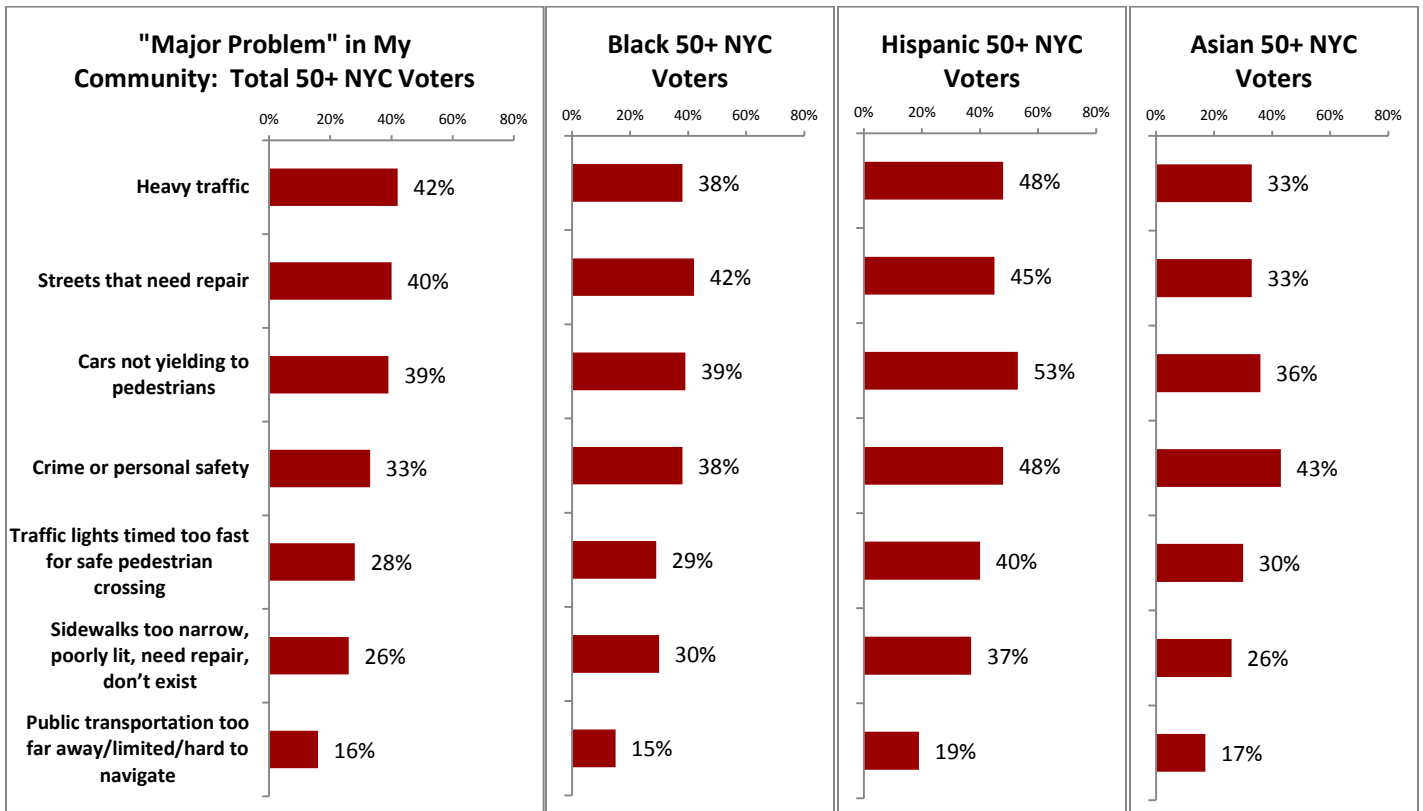


NYC 50+ Voters: Extremely/Very Likely to Vote for a Candidate who will work on Ensuring New Yorkers can afford to stay in their homes



Mobility and personal safety issues are also considered major community problems by many 50+ voters. Hispanics in particular are more likely to consider pedestrian-related features to be “major” problems in their community, with the following cited as “major problems” more often than other racial or ethnic groups: cars not yielding to pedestrians (53%); traffic lights timed too fast (40%); sidewalks too narrow, poorly lit, need repair or don’t exist (37%).

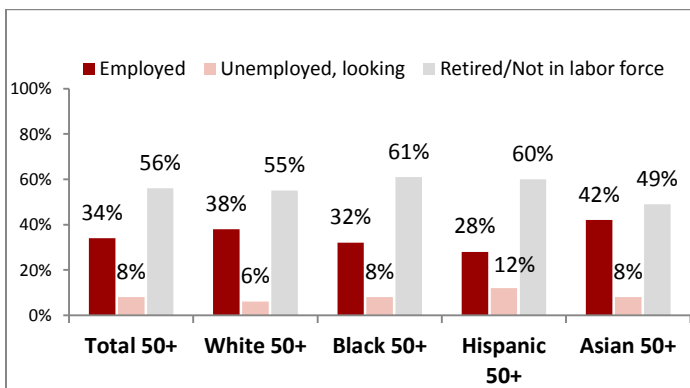
Crime and personal safety stands out as a “major problem” among Asian voters (43%).



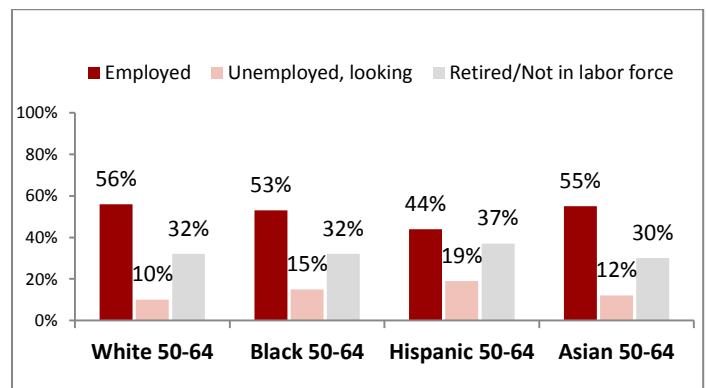
Work and Retirement

About four in ten voters age 50 and older are in the labor force, whether currently employed or looking for work; and labor force participation is even higher (50%) among Asian voters. Within the age cohort of 50-64, more than six in ten NYC voters are in the labor force, but unemployment is in the double digits and approaches a high of 20 percent among Hispanics.

NYC 50+ Voters: Employment Status

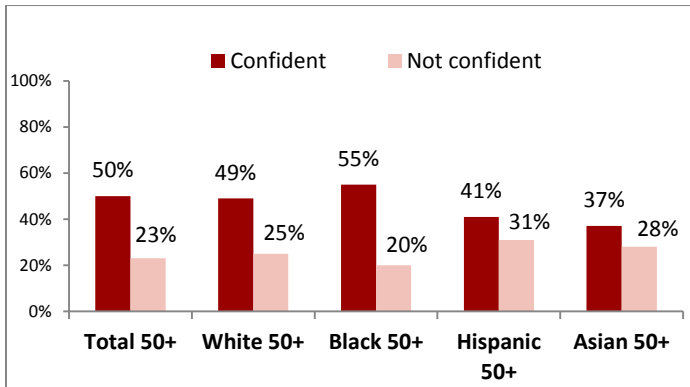


NYC Voters Age 50-64: Employment Status

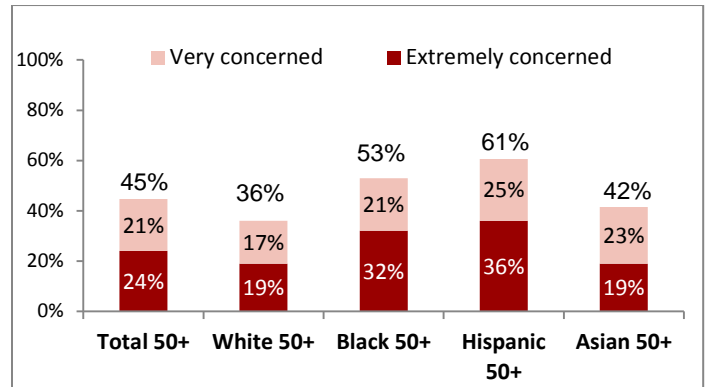


It may be in part on account of such high unemployment levels that 50+ voters in the labor force are not too confident about the possibility of retirement and nearly half report concern about age-based job discrimination. Those in the labor force most likely to be concerned about age-based discrimination in the workplace are Black (53%) and Hispanic (61%) voters. It follows that Black and Hispanic 50+ voters are more likely than other groups to say it should be a top priority of NYC elected officials to work on laws and policies that support older workers – nearly six in ten versus 33 percent of Asian and 37 percent of White 50+ voters.

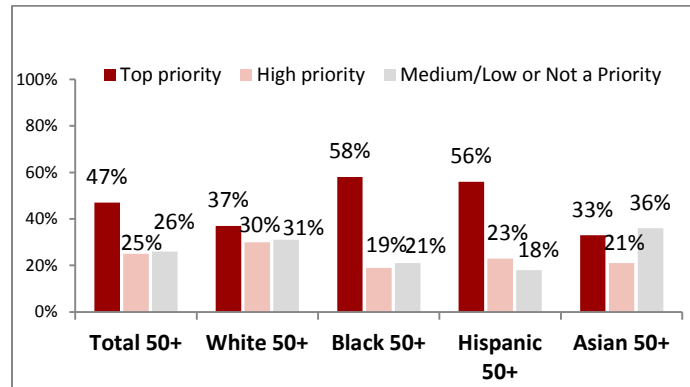
NYC 50+ Voters in Labor Force: How confident you will be able to retire?



NYC 50+ Voters in Labor Force: How concerned are you about age discrimination at work?



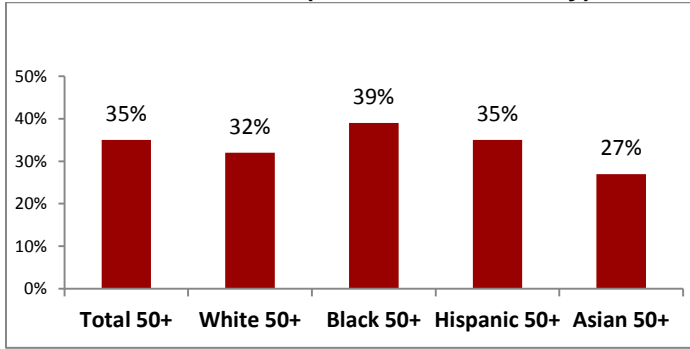
NYC 50+ Voters: How much of a priority should it be for NYC elected officials to work on laws and policies that support older workers?



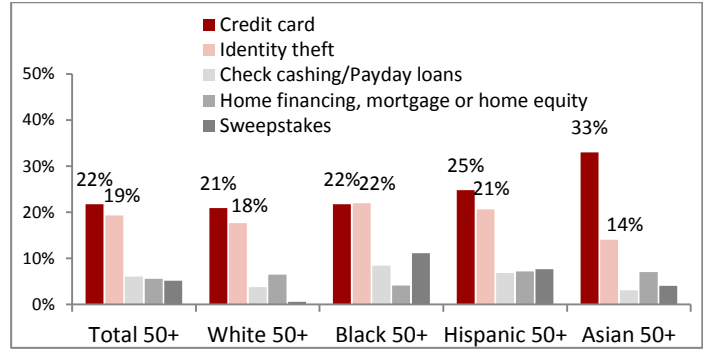
Consumer Protections

Voters 50 and older also feel vulnerable to consumer risks like frauds and scams. In the past five years (since 2008), one-third has encountered some type of intentional fraud against themselves or someone they know. Of them, two-thirds say the incident was reported. By far the most common types of fraud, scams or deceptive practices encountered are related to credit cards (22%) and identify theft (19%). Reported experience with consumer fraud is fairly consistent across multicultural groups with one exception: 50+ Asian voters are significantly more likely to report encountering credit card fraud (33%) and less likely to cite personal experience with identify theft (14%).

NYC 50+ Voters: Personally Encountered Fraud Past 5 Years (self or friend/family)

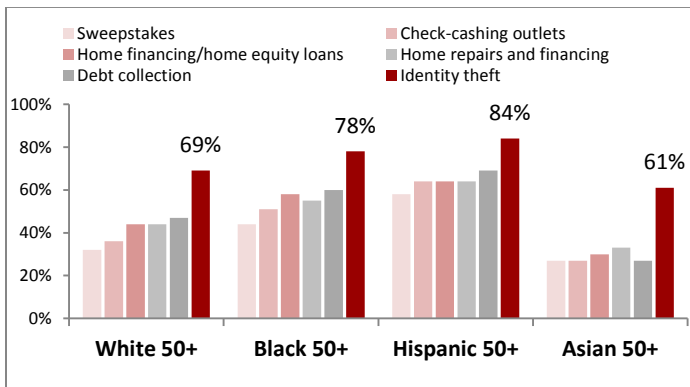


NYC 50+ Voters: Types of fraud or scams encountered

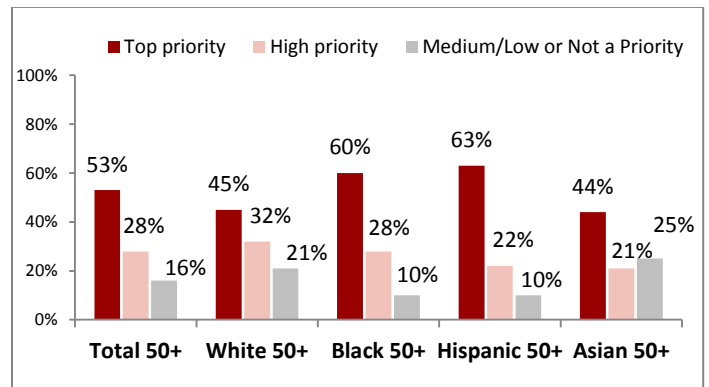


A majority of 50+ voters indicates high levels of concern about identity theft – significantly higher than any other type of fraudulent, unfair or deceptive practice. Relative to other scams or unfair practices, consumers are somewhat limited in their ability to protect themselves from this type of fraud, which can often go on undetected and have a catastrophic impact. Eight in ten believes it should be a top (53%) or high (28%) priority for NYC elected officials to work on strengthening laws that protect consumers from unfair and deceptive practices. High levels of concern are more likely among Black and Hispanic voters and these groups are also more likely to consider it a “top” priority for NYC elected officials.

NYC 50+ Voters: Extremely/Very Worried About Following Types of Potentially Fraudulent, Unfair or Deceptive Practices



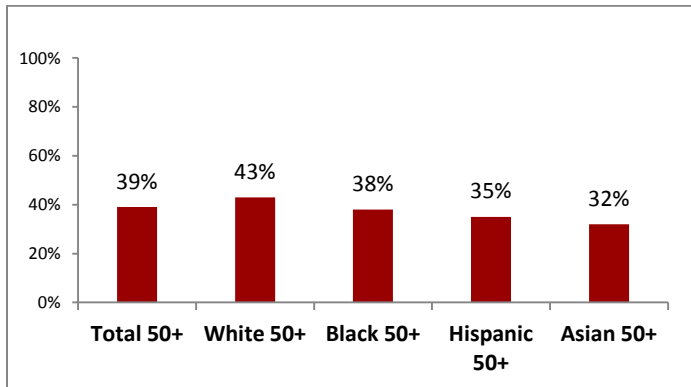
NYC 50+ Voters: How much of a priority should it be for NYC elected officials to strengthen laws that protect consumers from unfair and deceptive practices?



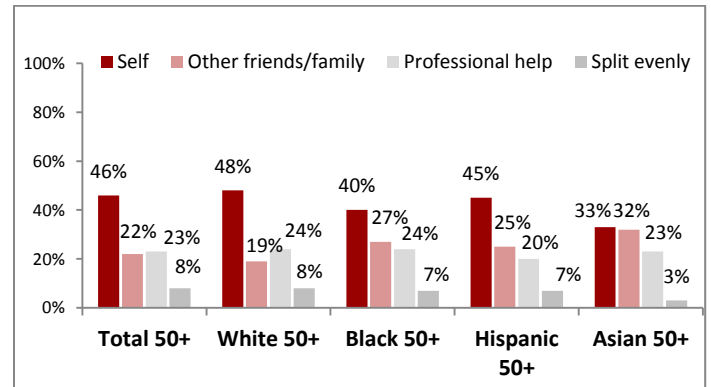
Caregiving and Community Services

Caring for elderly, aging, frail or disabled adult loved ones is the responsibility for roughly four in ten NYC voters age 50 and older. Hispanic and Asian voters are slightly less likely to identify themselves as a family caregiver (about one-third each). Of those who are providing care, many are the primary caregiver (46%) and say the impact of their family caregiving puts an overwhelming strain or a good deal of strain on their quality of life. (51% of 50+ caregivers in NYC are in the work force and 25% are employed in full time jobs.)

NYC 50+ Voters: Family Caregivers (for an adult family member or friend, currently or within the past 5 years)

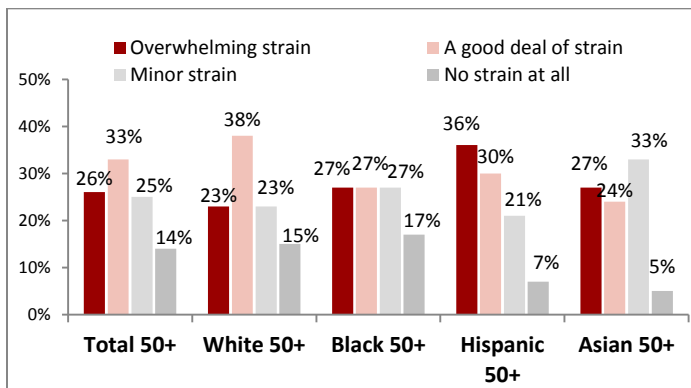


NYC 50+ Voters: (Among Caregivers) Who provides the majority of care for your family/friend?

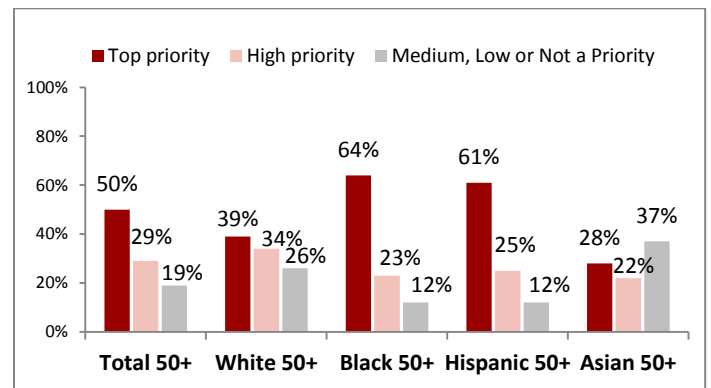


Examining data by multicultural groups reveals some differences. Asian voters 50+ are most likely to share the caregiving responsibilities equally with other friends and family members. As a result of this shared support, the impact of caregiving on this group is more likely to be qualified as “minor” and they are least likely to consider family caregiver supports to be a top or high priority for elected officials. Standing in sharp contrast are Hispanic 50+ caregivers who, like other groups, are likely to be themselves the primary provider of care for their loved one. More than one-third of Hispanic caregivers say their caregiving responsibilities put an “overwhelming strain” on the quality of life for themselves and their families. More than eight in ten Hispanic voters 50+ say family caregiver support should be a top (61%) to high (25%) priority for NYC elected officials. Black voters 50+ place a similar level of priority on this issue for elected officials.

NYC 50+ Voters: How much of a priority should it be for NYC elected officials to strengthen laws and fund services that support family caregivers?

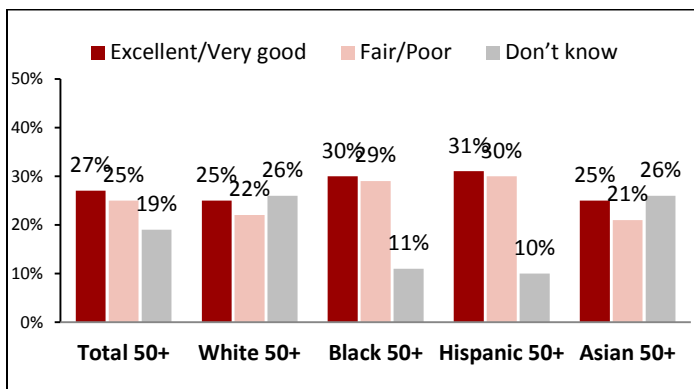


There are opportunities to improve community-based services that help residents maintain their independence as they age. About one-fifth of 50+ voters overall are not familiar enough with alternative transportation services (e.g. community vans, shuttles and volunteer drivers) or affordable long term care services (e.g. home health, personal care, adult day care and respite services) to give a rating. Remaining ratings are rather equally split between excellent/good and fair/poor.

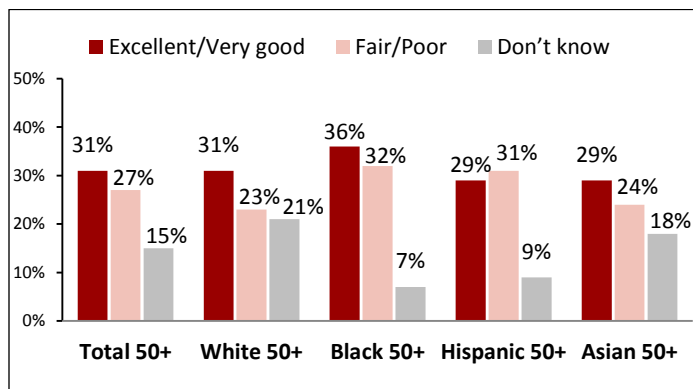
Overall, Black and Hispanic voters are the most likely to provide ratings on these community services (fewest saying don't know) yet rather large proportions still give fair to poor ratings. There is an opportunity to promote awareness and improve overall quality of these services.

Overall about three-fourths of 50+ voters feel it should be a top or high priority for NYC elected officials to promote age-friendly living in NYC which includes transportation options for residents of all ages to maintain their independence. The belief that this should be a priority is more common among Black and Hispanic voter groups and less common among Asian voters, similar to other issues. Compared to other voter groups, there is a pattern across all issues of Asian voters being less likely to rate it as a top priority. However, within only their own ratings, age-friendly living receives the second highest level of "top" priority ratings, following protecting consumers from unfair and deceptive practices.

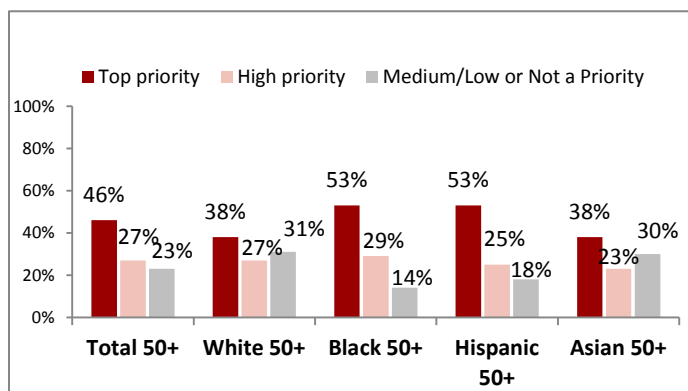
NYC 50+ Voters: How would you rate your community on affordable long-term care services at home?

These data were collected by Woelfel Research, Inc. and Universal Survey on behalf of AARP through a telephone survey of 1,302 New York City registered voters age 50 and older, which included 357 Black voters, 315 Hispanic voters; and an oversample of 305 Asian voters age 50 and older. Interviews were conducted between May 17 and June 30, 2013 in English, Spanish, Chinese (Mandarin and Cantonese), Tagalog, Korean and Hindi. The total sample has a margin of error of ±2.7 percent. Data have been weighted to reflect the 50 and older voter population in New York City.
