



Social Security: 2014 Connecticut Quick Facts



Connecticut's 65+ population is 533,000.

In 2012 Connecticut's population was about 3.6 million, with 533,000 being age 65 and older residents.¹

Social Security generates \$16.3 billion dollars in economic output for Connecticut.


In 2012, Connecticut residents received \$9.7 billion dollars from Social Security.⁴ Every \$1 dollar of Social Security received in Connecticut generates \$1.83 of economic output. Spending related to Social Security by beneficiaries, businesses and workers on goods and services generates \$16.3 billion in economic output for Connecticut.²

One in six Connecticut residents receives Social Security.

The Social Security program not only provides monthly benefits to retired workers, but also to families when the worker retires, dies, or becomes disabled. In 2012, over 56 million Americans received Social Security benefits; of these, 640,252 lived in Connecticut.³

In 2012, one in six Connecticut residents received Social Security.¹ While 71% of beneficiaries are retirees, 29% are not: 81,125 are people with disabilities; 41,604 are widows and widowers; 43,225 are children; and 20,979 are spouses.³

Nearly all Connecticut residents age 65 or older receive Social Security.

Over 18% of all people receive Social Security benefits; in Connecticut, 18% of residents do. However, older people are more likely to receive the benefit, with 92% of those ages 65 and over receiving it nationwide, and 91% of older Connecticut residents receiving it.¹

On average, Connecticut retirees receive about \$1,372 a month from Social Security.

The average yearly Social Security benefit for a Connecticut retiree in 2012 was \$16,461⁵


Social Security lifts 149,000 Connecticut residents out of poverty.

About 44% of the nation's older population would be living in poverty if they were not receiving Social Security. In Connecticut, 38% of the state's 65+ population also would have incomes below the poverty line if they did not receive Social Security.⁶

Social Security is the only source of income for one in four Connecticut residents age 65+.

Social Security makes up 50 percent or more of the income for 58 percent of Connecticut residents age 65 and older. A little more than one in four older Connecticut residents rely on Social Security as their only source of income.⁷
