



Background

Americans over the age of 50 consistently show up more often to vote compared to younger voters. Given the influence this powerful voting bloc will likely have on the 2018 mid-term elections, AARP surveyed 214 Hispanic voters age 50 and older in Colorado's 6th Congressional District between September 5-20, 2018, to assess what would be on their minds when they cast their ballots this fall and which candidates they would be backing.¹

Political divisiveness is one of the top concerns with Hispanic voters age 50+ with 71% saying they often worry about it. More than half disapprove of the job performances of President Trump (56%) and the Republicans in Congress (57%), while 45% disapprove of the job performance of Democrats in Congress. While Hispanic voters age 50+ generally see Colorado's economy getting stronger (47%), this optimism is not reflected in their own financial security with seven out of ten worrying that prices are rising faster than their incomes (73%) and feeling like they are not getting ahead (71%).

Key Electoral Issues

At least two-thirds of Hispanic voters age 50+ in Colorado CD-6 indicated that candidates' positions on lowering healthcare costs, strengthening and reforming Social Security, jobs and the economy, strengthening and reforming Medicare, and addressing rising prescription drug costs were very important to them.



Health Insurance

94%

94% of Hispanic voters age 50+ in Colorado CD-6 think Medicare is very important for people's health in retirement, and **87%** agree that Congress should make changes to ensure the program can continue to cover hospital benefits, as it does now, beyond 2029.

73% think it is unfair to deny coverage or make those with pre-existing conditions pay more for their health care.

77% do not agree with allowing insurance companies to charge older people up to five times more for health insurance.

Prescription Drugs

67%

Most Hispanic voters age 50+ (**67%**) feel that candidates' positions to address rising prescription drug costs are very important to them.

83% think it should be legal to import prescription drugs from Canada and Europe, and **53%** support preventing drug companies from stopping competitors from entering the market with generics.

64% think drug companies have a lot of influence over Members of Congress.

Retirement Security

83%

83% of Hispanic voters age 50+ in Colorado CD-6 think that Social Security is very important for financial security in retirement, and **64%** believe the government should do something to strengthen Social Security immediately.

51% of working Hispanic voters age 50+ are not confident they are saving enough for retirement.

Caregiving

84%

88% of Hispanic voters age 50+ support providing an income tax credit to family caregivers, regardless of whether they are or have been caregivers.

44% of Colorado CD-6 Hispanic voters age 50+ currently or have previously provided unpaid care for an adult loved one.
