



# **50+ Likely Voters** in Michigan

#### **Key Findings:**


- **Key voting bloc**: In one of the states hit hardest by coronavirus, President Trump trails Biden by 14 points among voters 50+, driven by huge drops among women 50+ and all voters 65+.
- But the shift goes beyond the virus: 50+ voters trust Biden more than Trump on a range of issues including on Trump's strengths in other states, like rebuilding the economy.
- The mailbox goes partisan: Michigan's vote-by-mail system is very new but already more than half of 50+ voters plan to use it this cycle though Biden voters are more than twice as likely as Trump voters to use it.
- The data also puts into stark relief how much COVID has disproportionately impacted Black Americans, with 65% of Black voters 50+ reporting that they know someone personally who has died of COVID compared to 17% of white voters 50+.
- · Much divides these voters, but they are united by a desire to protect Social Security and Medicare.








How confident are you that votes made by mail will be counted accurately?





How worried are you about not being able to vote because of the coronavirus?










## If the election for Senate were held today, who would you vote for?

Please indicate if you have a favorable or unfavorable view of...












### Do you support or oppose how Trump is managing the coronavirus pandemic?



Which worries you more, getting infected with COVID-19 or getting a vaccine for COVID-19?














Increase protections on nursing home residents during the coronavirus pandemic

Support family caregivers with paid time off to care for parents, spouses, or other loved ones









Benenson Strategy Group and GS Strategy Group conducted 1600 interviews – by phone, using registered voter lists – with likely 2020 voters in Michigan from August 30<sup>th</sup> to September 8<sup>th</sup>. 78% of interviews were conducted via cell phone; 22% via landline.

The survey included an oversample of 1200 50+ voters for additional analysis, including 400 African-American 50+ voters.

Data was weighed to ensure it was representative of the likely voting universe both overall and 50+.



The margin of sampling error for the entire data set is ±2.5% at the 95% confidence level.

• Among likely voters over the age of 50, the margin of sampling error is ±2.9% at the 95% confidence level.

Due to rounding, answer choices may not always add up to 100%.

Please note that due to rounding, a sum may appear to be one point more or less than its parts.

Note: All reported data is among 50+ likely voters except when otherwise specified.

Partisan crosstabs in this report represent how people identify themselves.
